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### **RESEARCH AND EDUCATION**

## **Christian Higher Education Research Council**

Sound research is essential to academic excellence and institutional improvement. This is why the CCCU established the Christian Higher Education Research Council, chaired by Dr. Laurie Schreiner of Azusa Pacific University. The council will guide the CCCU and its institutions in conducting, interpreting, and disseminating sound quality research that fosters institutional improvement and supports an accurate and compelling narrative about Christian higher education in the U.S.

## Christian Higher Education Journal

The CCCU now provides a free institutional subscription to *Christian Higher Education: An International Journal of Research, Theory, and Practice* to the chief academic officer at every CCCU institution. Published quarterly, this peer-reviewed journal contains original research, meta-analyses, analytical essays, book reviews, and empirical studies to enable our institutions to keep abreast of important developments and best practices in Christian higher education.

### Summer Academic Programs



As it continues to offer quality semester-long programs, the CCCU is expanding its selection of short-term summer study opportunities for students. Summer 2016 saw the expansion of our current summer study program in the Middle East and the launch of a new collaborative summer program in Washington, D.C. between the American Studies Program and Biola University.

# INSTITUTIONAL COLLABORATION

# **Accreditation Coordinating Council**

Since Christian colleges and universities increasingly face challenges to institutional and program accreditations, the CCCU established a new Accreditation Coordinating Council. The council's members are individuals from CCCU institutions who are active in regional accrediting bodies as well as in program-based accrediting bodies, such as social work, education, or counseling. The goal is to ensure CCCU institutions are represented both in accrediting bodies and in national conversation on accreditation.

# **Coordinating Council for Doctoral Education**

In order to support our institutions' growing commitment to doctoral education, the CCCU established a new Coordinating Council for Doctoral Education, chaired by Dr. Kevin Lawson, director of the Doctor of Educational Studies program at Talbot School of Theology. This group fosters the development of strong doctoral programs in the CCCU by promoting collaboration among doctoral program directors, doctoral faculty, and others who wish to benefit from networking with their peers.

# **ADVOCACY & COMMUNICATIONS**

# **Advocacy Investment Benefit**

Our institutions face growing political and cultural challenges to Christian higher education. Thus, the CCCU added a senior-level communications and political strategist to its staff: Dr. Doug Koopman, special advisor for strategic communication and public affairs. Koopman provides leadership to the CCCU's work both to develop a comprehensive public relations campaign for Christian higher education and to foster collaboration around accreditation issues.

The content was specifically curated to included topics that are not only relevant and timely but also reflect on issues that have been important to the CCCU and its members over the past 40 years.





# Young Alumni Award

The CCCU Young Alumni Award is given to an individual who has graduated from a CCCU institution in the past 10 years and has achieved uncommon leadership or success in a way that reflects the values of Christian higher education. The 2016 winner was Houghton College alumnus Steven Grudda. He is an associate for Endsight Consulting, a firm that advises in the area of business development in frontier markets around the world, with a special focus on Africa.

# **GLOBAL HIGHER EDUCATION**

# **Dellenback Fellowship**

The Dellenback Fellowship was established in 2003 to support Christian colleges and universities outside the U.S. by connecting CCCU international institutions who request assistance with experienced academic administrators interested in developing Christian higher education abroad. Thanks to a generous gift from Mary Jane Dellenback, the wife of former CCCU president John Dellenback, the fellowship was revived in 2016 and recently funded a site visit by a U.S. academic leader to Uganda Christian University. Two additional institutional applications are pending for 2017.

# **International Partnership**

The CCCU is partnering with the International Association for the Promotion of Christian Higher Education (IAPCHE) to sponsor and plan the third Biennial Conference on Internationalizing Christian Higher Education, to be held in Grand Rapids, Michigan, in June 2017. The event will advance Christian higher education and introduce more international scholars and educators to the work of the CCCU.

# **ORGANIZATIONAL EFFECTIVENESS**

# Changes to membership structure

With guidance by a task force on membership, the CCCU Board of Directors both reaffirmed the organization's unwavering commitment to Christian higher education and historic Christian faith and simplified and clarified its associational categories in 2016. The new structure will have three categories (Governing Member, Associate Member, and Collaborative Partner) and will allow international institutions the opportunity for full membership. The new structure takes effect July 1, 2017.

# **Technology upgrades**

The CCCU is updating its technology in its D.C. offices. This includes modernizing our phone and internet systems, upgrading our server capacity, and transitioning to a newer version of iMIS, our database management system. All of this better enables us to maintain accurate data and to improve our services to members.

# THE YEAR IN REVIEW

# **PUBLIC ADVOCACY**

The CCCU's government and external relations staff works on behalf of its members to advocate in Washington, D.C., and beyond for religious freedom and Christian higher education in the United States, as well as to promote the value of Christian higher education and its vital role within higher education to the broader culture.

# Preserving Religious Freedom for Christian Higher Education in California

California's state legislature introduced a bill proposing to curtail the extent to which faith-integrated institutions of higher education could participate in state funding. The proposal was based on the incorrect supposition that state money was funding discrimination based on sexual orientation and gender identity. The CCCU

helped organize a national effort to correct misinformation about discrimination at Christian colleges and universities and to identify how the legislation would adversely impact minority and first-generation students, who excel best at nonprofit, private colleges. The proposal was retracted and replaced with a bill that has increased reporting requirements but does not affect state funding.

### Title IX Webpage on Department of Education's Website

After the Department of Education (DOE) received requests under the Freedom of Information Act from the Human Rights Campaign and others to acquire for publication a list of universities that have asked the DOE to acknowledge their religious exemption from aspects of Title IX, several senators then asked the DOE to publish that list on its website. Though the CCCU always supports transparency, this list has been dubbed by some as a "Shame List" and has been used in attempts to marginalize institutions who are following the law. Because of these negative purposes for which the website has been used, the CCCU has requested that the DOE take down the website.

# **Russell Amendment on Religious Hiring Protections for Government Funding**

In the spring, the CCCU joined an advocacy effort with many of its religious freedom partners in support of an amendment to the annual National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) that would have clarified long-standing religious hiring protections outlined in Title VII of the 1964 Civil Rights Act. A 2014 executive order from the Obama Administration potentially conflicts with those protections for recipients of government funds through grants, contracts, sub-contracts, and purchase orders. Unfortunately, after much congressional deliberation, the amendment was labeled too controversial for the NDAA and was scrapped days before the act passed Congress and was sent to the President for his signature.



### **HHS Mandate at the Supreme Court**

A five-year-long dispute between the U.S. government and religious nonprofits – including more than 20 members of the CCCU – regarding the requirement for those institutions to provide coverage for contraceptives and abortifacients they religiously objected to providing reached the U.S. Supreme Court, which heard oral arguments in the spring. After the hearing, the government conceded that religious objections by these nonprofit institutions did not impact access to contraceptives. Thus, the Supreme Court vacated previous circuit court rulings and sent all the individual cases back to their respective lower courts due to a lack of dispute between the parties. This ruling, which was not made on the basis of the facts of the case, is seen as a win for religious freedom, since it allows these institutions to offer health insurance that is compatible with their faith tenets.

# **Comprehensive Legislation to Secure Religious Liberty into the Future**

In 2016, the CCCU convened nine meetings with almost 200 religious leaders to discuss various legislative and legal strategies available to secure religious liberty into the future. These discussions were used to educate our members and other religious leaders about the various options and to discuss the pros, cons, and ultimate viability of each option. One idea the CCCU solicited specific feedback on was the idea of a comprehensive bill that would secure rights at the federal level for LGBT persons in basic areas of public access – employment, housing, shopping, financial credit, and jury duty service – while also securing robust freedoms for religious persons and institutions to live out their missions and convictions. The continued exploration of this approach has received wide support, and the CCCU is grateful to have had the opportunity to bring timely and relevant conversations about important topics to its members and other religious leaders.

# **Correspondence with the NCAA**

In March, the organization Campus Pride sent a letter to the NCAA requesting that colleges and universities with a Title IX exemption be excluded from NCAA. The CCCU sent its own letter to the NCAA emphasizing Christian colleges and universities' fair treatment of student athletes and clear delineation of their policies, as well as the many positive contributions that CCCU institutions add to the NCAA's membership and mission. The NCAA decided not to honor Campus Pride's request.



# **PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT**

At the heart of every CCCU institution is its personnel. In order to promote the professional development of Christian higher educational professionals and to foster collegiality among peers from multiple campuses, the CCCU promotes professional development through a variety of peer-group and topic-based conferences and institutes. These events expose attendees to leading professionals in their respective fields while also providing spiritual support and encouragement to more effectively fulfill their institution's Christ-centered mission.

Some highlights of 2016 conferences and institutes included:

# Leadership Development Institutes

The Leadership Development Institute and the Women's Leadership Development Institute were filled to capacity. These institutes provide direction, support, and professional development to 48 emerging leaders from 30 campuses, preparing many of them for future senior leadership roles within Christian higher education.





# **Multi-Academic Conferences**

In February, the CCCU hosted back-to-back conferences for multiple cabinet-level peer groups. The combined format provided a positive synergy to the events and created significant opportunities for stimulating discussion, professional development, and collaboration. The combined Chief Enrollment, Communication, and Advancement Officers' conference totaled 158 attendees from 81 campuses. The Chief Academic, Student Development, and Campus Ministry Directors' conference attracted 160 attendees from 64 campuses.



# **Diversity Conference**

The CCCU continues to champion racial, ethnic, and gender diversity as an important priority for its members and affiliates. One way that we strengthen our campuses' commitment to diversity is through the annual Diversity Conference, which brings together professionals from a wide variety of institutions for professional development and mutual encouragement in their diversity efforts. This year's annual Diversity Conference, held at Nyack College's New York City campus, was the largest stand-alone CCCU event in 2016, with a total of 244 attendees from 44 institutions.

### Writer's Retreat for New Book on Diversity

Twenty writers gathered together at Cedar Springs Christian Retreat Center in Washington in June to collaborate on a new book with the working title, "*Diversity Matters for Christian Higher Education: Strat-egies for More Fully Modeling God's Kingdom*," to be published by Abilene Christian University Press. The CCCU has received donations from multiple sources to support this important publication.

# ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

CCCU institutions are committed to high-quality, faith-integrating academics. The foundation of this work is professors who combine professional excellence with a vibrant Christian faith that actively influences their teaching and research. The CCCU supports this work by developing CCCU professors as Christian teachers and scholars. Some initiatives of 2016 include:



# New Faculty Institute

After a two-year hiatus, the CCCU New Faculty Institute returned under the leadership of Dr. David Smith, director of the Kuyers Center for Christian Teaching and Learning at Calvin College. The institute empowers CCCU professors in their first three years to think deeply about Christian integration in their teaching and become more productive scholars. It also inducts them into the broader culture of Christian academia. This year's institute included a full group of 36 new professors from 18 member campuses.



# **Scholar's Retreat**

Thanks to a partnership with the Issachar Fund, CCCU scholars from any discipline have an opportunity to spend a sabbatical period for as brief as six weeks or as long as a year at a peaceful, fully furnished cottage in Holland, Michigan, that is large enough to accommodate a small family. Selected scholars spend their time working on research, reflection, writing, or production of scholarship

or creative work that is connected to one of the Issachar Fund's four areas of inquiry: science and faith; technology, medical care, and human dignity; Christ-like virtues in a pluralistic world; and creation care.

The following scholars are using the retreat for the 2016-17 academic year:

# **SPRING 2017**

**Karen D. Crozier,** director of faculty development and diversity and an associate professor of practical theology at Fresno Pacific University in Fresno, California, will be studying the life and work of Fannie Lou Hamer, a leader in civil and human rights who also had a commitment to caring for creation.

# FALL 2016

**Charles A. Hannema,** associate professor of business at Bethel University in St. Paul, Minnesota, spent the fall semester examining the ethical tensions and tradeoffs that occur in the acquisition and application of data to help businesses improve their decision-making.

## **Network and Initiative Grants for Christian Scholars**

These grants, made possible through a partnership with the Hansen family, encourage collaborative scholarship among professors serving at CCCU member institutions and connect these professors with broader scholarly networks. The goal is to create and disseminate high quality scholarship that brings Christian voices into contemporary academic conversations.

## Bridging the Two Cultures of Science and the Humanities



This project endeavors to contribute to and support a campus-wide culture that constructively engages the difficult and important questions and opportunities raised by the field of science and religion today. The first iteration, held over 2014-2016 and funded by a grant from the Templeton Religion Trust, offered an eight-week research seminar extending over two summers for a cohort of 25 faculty drawn primarily from CCCU institutions, including institutions in Africa and South America. A second iteration will occur in 2017-2019 thanks to the partnership of the Templeton Religion Trust and the Blankemeyer Foundation.



### Mr. Darwin's Tree

The Templeton Religious Trust also fostered a robust discussion of science and religion among students and faculty at CCCU campuses by funding the tour of *Mr. Darwin's Tree*, a one-man play written by the award-winning British playwright and director Murray Watts. Over the course of 2016, *Mr. Darwin's Tree* was performed on 13 CCCU campuses, and the performances were followed by panel discussions that explored the complex questions of faith and doubt raised by the play.

BestSemester programs introduced CCCU students to a wide variety of life-changing experiential learning opportunities. These included:

- Working a music tour based in Nashville, Tennessee, from start to finish
- Organic farming, social work, ecology, and small businesses in Costa Rica
- Casting offices, post-production companies, major motion pictures, and talent agencies in Los Angeles, CA
- Schools, orphanages, and refugee assistance in Amman, Jordan
- Internship and practicum placement in social work and global health-related fields in Uganda
- Intensive, primary source-based research directed by a faculty scholar at Wycliffe Hall, Oxford University.



New BestSemester developments for 2016

The Uganda Studies Program implemented an innovative Global Health Emphasis that provides students with opportunities to apply their learning experientially in Ugandan settings such as hospitals, clinics, child health centers, and public health organizations. The Latin American Studies Program welcomed a new director, Dr. Debbie Berho, who is reshaping the program into a destination program for Spanish majors and is continuing to connect with Spanish faculty at several CCCU campuses.



The American Studies Program celebrated its 40th Anniversary with a commemorative event at the National Press Club in Washington, D.C.

The Student Academic Programs Commission conducts periodic reviews of each BestSemester program to ensure high quality and operational effectiveness. This year, the L.A. Film Studies Center received a strong positive review by members of the Commission for its commitment to faith integration and its preparation of students for productive vocations in film and media.

BestSemester directors and staff developed a new purpose statement and educational goals, which were used to create a standardized Common Program Evaluation. This instrument, administered by all BestSemester programs at the end of each semester, provides useful student feedback to identify areas for ongoing program improvement.
